IMMEDIATE INVESTMENTS

The NDP has a vision for moving beyond this recent time of challenge in the direction of something better. While the Liberals and Conservatives are focused on corporate tax cuts for their friends, an NDP government will make the needed investments in real people's lives.

This table shows the initial investments that an NDP government will make, immediately in the first year, in housing, health care, mental health, child care, and the environment. Costs will change over time, some programs will be ramped up and some require a higher initial investment.

NEW REVENUES

The Liberals and Conservatives are budgeting big corporate giveaways for their wealthy friends. The NDP knows that we need to invest in real people's lives, and that means that those at the top will have to pay their fair share. These are the sources of revenue that an NDP government will access.

CAPITAL INVESTMENTS

In addition to the immediate investments that an NDP government will make, we will make permanent, one time investments in the infrastructure that Nova Scotia needs. Our plan to build housing, long-term care beds, and invest in the sustainable infrastructure required for a green economy will create thousands of good jobs while we build the future that we want. Much of these costs will be shared with other levels of government.

Adding 1,000 more community housing units in the next four years will require purchase and construction investments of up to \$158.4 million, repaid largely through the rental income of the new units. The province's contribution will be the subsidy for rent-geared-to-income units.

The \$386 million capital investment required for the NDP's commitment to new and replacement long-term care beds will be made by the public and non-profit groups that manage nursing homes, backed up by the province's agreement to pay its share of the costs for each resident of the new and renewed nursing homes.

The NDP will spend up to \$5 million over the next five years for any renovation or new construction required to open new Collaborative Emergency Centres.

An NDP government will spend up to \$21.5 million over the next four years for space for same-day/next-day mental health clinics in communities across the province.

The renovation or construction necessary for **four new child care centres** with a \$10 maximum daily fee and **free**, **expanded before and after school care** is budgeted at \$9.8 million in the next 18 months.

The NDP would invest a capital contribution of \$3.2 million for the design study of a new Cape Breton Central Library.

Home retrofits and deep retrofitting of public housing will start with an investment of \$63 million repaid from the reduction in energy costs through financing arrangements like Property Assessed Clean Energy programs that ensure repayment is not from general revenues.

An NDP government will build the complete Blue Route by 2030, beginning with an expected capital cost of \$51.3 million over the next four years less contributions from other partners in active transportation to meet climate goals while adding green jobs.

ECONOMIC MULTIPLIERS

The investments that an NDP government will make in Nova Scotians have real returns that cannot be measured in budgetary cycles. These investments have an economic payback over time and people then benefit from the tax revenue earned from sustainable growth. Here is a notable example from Quebec:
